1,212 Pounds of Meds and 17 Bins of Sharps Collected by HC DrugFree's Team

With beautiful weather and an army of more than 50 volunteers, HC DrugFree's team put on their green t-shirts and collected medications and sharps at our convenient drive-thru collection site in the Wilde Lake Village Center.

At our location, we collected 1,212 lbs of meds and 17 bins of sharps in 4 hours on Saturday.

Even after all these years, it was surprising to see the amount of expired or unwanted over-the-counter and prescription medication and "sharps" (needles, syringes and EpiPens) collected. Truly, you need to see it to believe it (so please come out and volunteer for our next event). It makes us wonder how much more is in homes throughout the community.
