

Monday, April 1: Final 2019 Senior Week Program

HC DrugFree's final 2019 presentation of *Senior Week: Staying Safe in Ocean City* will be held at Marriotts Ridge High School on Monday, April 1 at 7:00 p.m. Free and open to the public.

Keep Your Family Safe (Including Your Pets) - See You on April 27

Bring us your pet medication too!!! As you are cleaning out your medicine cabinets to bring all your medications and sharps (needles, syringes and EpiPens) to HC DrugFree's drive-thru collection on Saturday, April 27 from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m., don't forget to gather unwanted and expired pet medication. Don't toss meds/sharps into the trash. Don't flush them into the water system. Don't allow them to get into the wrong hands.

Our convenient drive-thru is your easiest disposal option for all medications and sharps, but don't be late. Medications are transported no later than 2:00 p.m.

On April 27, **bring your pet along for a Saturday morning ride**, circle the Wilde Lake Village parking lot, hand HC DrugFree's team your unwanted items (guarded by the Howard County Police and the Drug Enforcement Administration) and head to the nearest dog park with your loyal friend.

Howard County Teens Ask Questions & Experts Respond

Using an access code provided to HC DrugFree by the National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA), Howard County teens joined more than 1,900 other teens from across the U.S. to submit questions to experts/scientists on *National Drugs and Alcohol Chat Day*. Here are **2 of the questions submitted by Howard County youth and answered by NIDA's team**:

Question 1: Can I die from smoking weed?

<u>Answer</u>: Most drugs can cause overdose and death if taken in high enough quantities. They can also cause death from accidents as a result of driving while being high -see this link for more information -

- https://www.drugabuse.gov/publications/drugfacts/drugged-driving. Marijuana can also cause a variety of health effects, including learning, attention and memory problems, increased heart rate, anxiety, paranoia, and even psychosis in some cases.

Question 2: If someone were to smoke marijuana everyday for a year but they are highly active, how long would it take to pass a urine test?

Answer: Smoking marijuana everyday for a year could induce serious health problems. For example, chronic marijuana use is associated with an increased risk for psychotic disorders, such as schizophrenia. Regardless of the time frame of marijuana use, marijuana breakdown products (i.e., marijuana metabolites) remain in the body for weeks after use. One's level of physical activity has little effect on the removal of marijuana from the body. Thus, the detection of marijuana or its metabolites in urine can last for weeks after use of the substance.

Parents and guardians are invited to a free documentary screening and panel discussion around anxiety in youth. This 55-minute film features candid interviews with children and young adults who struggle, or have struggled, with anxiety - including Olympic swimmer Michael Phelps. This film explores the causes, symptoms and effects of anxiety and stress and encourages youth and their families to seek help. Middle and high school students are invited to attend with a parent or guardian. Each film screening will be followed by a discussion with local experts.
