
Joan Webb Scornaienchi, the Executive Director of HC DrugFree was one of the dynamic women recognized for making positive changes throughout our County.

### April is Alcohol Awareness Month

Alcohol Awareness Month is to increase outreach and education regarding the dangers of alcoholism while drawing more attention to the causes and effects of alcoholism as well as how to help families and communities deal with drinking problems.

According to the MD Department of Health, the association between suicide and alcohol use or misuse has been studied for years, but with the continued rise in the suicide rate, understanding the influence of alcohol has become imperative. Individuals who are dependent on substances often have a number of other risk factors for suicide, such as social and financial problems. Common outcomes of untreated alcohol abuse and dependence include social withdrawal, breakdown of social bonds, and social marginalization, which are also warning signs associated with suicide. Alcohol use may lead to suicidality through disinhibition, impulsiveness, impaired judgment, and other high-risk behaviors that result in self-harm, but it may also be used as a means to ease the distress associated with committing an act of suicide.

Alcohol misuse/dependence, itself, could be viewed as a version of self-harm: alcohol is estimated to cause about 20-30% of cases of esophageal cancer, liver cancer, cirrhosis of the liver, homicide, epilepsy, and motor vehicle accidents. According to the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Service Administration (SAMHSA), a diagnosis of alcohol misuse or dependence is associated with a suicide risk that is 10 times greater than those in the general population.
